CREATE HOPE - STAND FOR THE LAND SYMBOLS OF SOLIDARITY

#### 3rd symbol was a microphone,

which represents the importance of the media in informing people about their rights and how to claim them. One of Development and Peace's partners in Honduras is ERIC, the Equipo de Reflexión, Investigación y Comunicación, the Reflection, Research and Communication Team in English. This Jesuit organization investigates violations of the human rights of the poor and the dispossessed. It helps communities defend territories that are being threatened by large-scale profit-driven economic projects. It supports and accompanies those who are unjustly criminalized for defending their rights. ERIC also produces radio programs that promote freedom of expression and the right to information and provide reliable information on the problems that local communities face.

The director of Radio Progreso-ERIC, Fr Ismael Moreno, SJ (Padre Melo) said: "If you don't see things from the viewpoint of the groups whose rights are being constantly violated and whose freedom of expression has been taken from them, then tell me: where is the Christian gospel?"

Padre Melo has been internationally recognised not only by communities but also by governmental groups, churches, universities and global civil society organisations.

Berta Cáceres, a brave Lenca indigenous woman and winner of the 2015 Goldman prize for environmental defenders, was shot dead two days before her 45th birthday by hired hitmen on 2 March 2016 after years of threats linked to her fearless work to defend the Gualcarque River, its surrounding environment and people and her & their opposition to the 22-megawatt Agua Zarca dam. In Canada the Wet'suwet'en also want to protect the Wedzin Kwa (Morice River) and face legal and RCMP enforcement of injunctions sought by Coastal Gas Link whose project goes against the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples — something both the <u>province andfederal governments support</u> — by violating the community's ability to provide <u>free, prior and informed consent</u>.

Twelve Wet'suwet'en land defenders have applied to the Supreme Court of British Columbia to have criminal contempt charges stayed following RCMP raids in 2021. "Society is rightly concerned with **how a special unit of RCMP (C-IRG)** acts with impunity, using racist language and violence against unarmed Indigenous women. Now it's in the court's hands to decide if this is still acceptable in 2023," said Sleydo' (Molly Wickham), spokesperson for the Gidimt'en Checkpoint and one of the 12.

They cite widespread Charter violations stemming from police misconduct as the reasoning. The court applications allege an "abuse of process" and highlight the RCMP's use of "disproportionate and excessive force" in November 2021.

Wet'suwet'en hereditary chiefs said the company doesn't have consent to cross their territory. In an explainer, <u>The Indigenous Foundation</u> writes that "the pipelines violate Wet'suwet'en sovereignty and put both the land and women of the Wet'suwet'en Nation at risk."

#### Doctrine of Discovery formally repudiated by Vatican

The Doctrine of Discovery was a legal framework based on 15th century papal bulls that gave early Christian explorers permission to conquer, displace and enslave non-Christian Indigenous Peoples.

The Dicastery for Culture and Education, and the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development <u>released a statement</u> 30 March 2023 clarifying, with emphasis, that "The 'doctrine of discovery' is not part of the teaching of the Catholic Church." They rejected the "doctrine of discovery" that was used to justify centuries of colonialism.

#### Whose law?

In 1997, the Supreme Court of Canada affirmed the Wet'suwet'en never gave up their Rights and Title to the territory in a landmark case called <u>Delgamuukw-Gisdaywa</u>.

Yet on 28 March 2023 <u>five people were arrested</u> by the RCMP after being told there was no obligation for them to provide access to consult legal counsel prior to a search under a warrant issued by the B.C. courts, land defenders told The Narwhal. After a few seconds and a brief back-and-forth exchange, several officers moved in and started the arrests, mainly of women, for obstruction.

CBC: 9 March 2023, the RCMP's federal watchdog agency <u>launched an investigation into</u> the Community-Industry Response Group (C-IRG), a special unit policing protests against resource extraction in B.C. The Civilian Review and Complaints Commission (CRCC), which receives and oversees public grievances against the Mounties, said it would be examining whether the unit's operations are consistent with the Charter, legislation on the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous People as well as the findings of the national inquiry into missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls.

# 5. POPE FRANCIS ON WOMEN

What he has done, what he has not done, will not do

Women's way: Pope opens path for more women at Vatican, in church

In his 10 years as pontiff, Pope Francis Pope Francis has sought to include more women in the work and governance of Vatican commissions and Roman Curia offices. Today there are 1,165 women working at the Vatican compared to 846 in 2013, making up 23.4% of the total workforce, according to Vatican News March 8 [*International Women's Day*]. When it comes to roles in the Roman Curia, more than one in four employees is now a woman.

Within the Curia, five women hold the rank of undersecretary, and one has the rank of secretary: Salesian Sister Alessandra Smerilli, whom the pope appointed to the No. 2 position at the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development in 2021 [whose Prefect is Cardinal Michael Czerny, SJ, a Canadian]. It is the highest post ever held by a woman at the Holy See.

The pope has said he intends to appoint the first female prefect now that it is possible for laypeople, and, therefore, women, to lead dicasteries, according to "Praedicate Evangelium," the pope's constitution reforming the Curia.

Pope Francis has also, for the first time, appointed women as full members of Vatican dicasteries, when previously that role was reserved to cardinals and some bishops. Members play a key role and vote along with prefects and secretaries at plenary assemblies.

So, while the pope has been bringing more women to "a place at the table" in Rome, he also has opened up new ways for women's voices to be heard.

Reuters: "I like to think that if women could enjoy full equality of opportunity, they could contribute substantially to the necessary change towards a world of peace,

inclusion, solidarity and integral sustainability," the pope said. Francis has condemned discrimination against women in the past but, like his predecessors, he has ruled out a female priesthood. The Catholic Church teaches that only men can become priests because Jesus chose men as his apostles."

The evolution of Pope Francis on women: some movement, but more needed

"When it comes to the broad topic of women, many "Francis Catholics" are able to accept his so-called "blind spot," because in other ways he models the Vatican II values they long to see. For others, it is not merely a weakness but a misogynistic betrayal of the Gospel that deprives the church, causes great spiritual harm and furthers the oppression of women globally.

Francis' approach to appointing women has been piecemeal.

In 2021, he <u>changed canon law</u> to allow for the installation of all laypeople into the ministries of acolyte and lector, and formalized the ministry of catechist, <u>opening</u> it to all laypeople. [Not a big deal, merely regularising what was already common & widespread in many places including Canada.]

Perhaps more celebrated, in 2016, he <u>listened</u> to the women religious of the International Union of Superiors General, or UISG, who asked him to further study the possibility of women deacons. He has since <u>convened</u> two papal commissions to take up this question, and while the process is clear as mud, the ordination of women is a question under review at the Vatican. ... How can such a pastoral man not hear the cries of women in his own church? What encounter informed him to characterize women's ordination advocates as operating from a "spirit of the isolated conscience," as he wrote in <u>Let Us Dream</u>? How can he call for women's rights in society and not scrutinize his own role as the supreme leader of the largest patriarchy in the world?

I remember the first time a priest mentioned the word "synodality" over a dinner in Rome and to be honest, I didn't understand why the bishops needed a fancy concept for collegiality behind closed doors. But Francis has imbued meaning into that word for me by modeling it.

Now, synodality can feel like justice deferred for those most in need. And for women, it can feel like a dressed up way of saying *slow down with all that equality business*, *ladies*.

But today women are appointed to Vatican positions without a headline, cardinals and bishops are openly discussing the question of women's ordination to the diaconate and priesthood, and at the very least, there are increasing opportunities for the voices of women to be heard. And if there are opportunities for women's voices to be heard, at least we have a pope who has shown he knows how to listen every now and again."

Personally, I, Andrew, am in favour of women's ordination. As a layman this applies to me: Canon 212 §3. "According to the knowledge, competence, and prestige which they possess, they have the right and even at times the duty to manifest to the sacred pastors their opinion on matters which pertain to the good of the Church and to make their opinion known to the rest of the Christian faithful, without prejudice to the integrity of faith and morals, with reverence toward their pastors, and attentive to common advantage and the dignity of persons."

"It is no secret that even the best medieval theologians, such as Thomas Aquinas and Bonaventure [ouch!], held that women do not have fully formed intellects, an idea that can be traced back to the philosophy of Aristotle. ... Thomas Aquinas was a brilliant 13th century theologian who contributed to the church a vast corpus of theological insights. However, by making his doctrine official teaching, the church turned a deaf ear to modern science and to other theological ideas, such as the notion of the primacy of Christ formulated by the Franciscan theologian Duns Scotus.

Although the Catholic Church has supported modern science, reflected by the Vatican's Pontifical Academy of Sciences, it has not adopted the principal scientific shifts of modern biology, evolution or quantum physics, despite the fact that these areas are pillars of modern science. As a result, the official theology of the church is based on the ancient cosmology of Ptolemy and the medieval Thomistic-Aristotelian metaphysical synthesis."

Born Denise Delio in 1955 ... she became a Carmelite. They gave Delio her name. "Ilia" is the Greek feminine translation of Elijah, the prophet who, according to the Hebrew Scriptures, ascended Mount Carmel to challenge 450 prophets of the false god Baal. After four years in the cloister, she requested a leave and was sent to discern with the Franciscans in North Plainfield, N.J.\* Though they, too, wore the habit and followed a somewhat regimented life, they had an openness to the world that Delio found freeing. Delio redid her novitiate and joined the Franciscans, [and] now belongs to a religious community that attempts to live out religious life as an open system. Known as the Franciscans of Washington, D.C., it is a small community of vowed women who seek to vitalize the Franciscan charism in the 21st century.

"After a young adulthood spent trying to transcend the world, Delio now wants to be immersed in it. "The Franciscan way is the way of the concrete," she says, "seeing the love of God in the leper, among the flowers and birds, in the moon. Francis taught us a consciousness of God in the concrete."

The word "universal" does not adequately capture the rich meaning of *katholikos* as the ancient Greeks used it. "*Katholikos* means 'through the whole' or 'throughout the whole,' " she says. "It connotes an active consciousness of the whole or a seeking to make whole."
